MICRO, SMALL AND MEDIUM ENTERPRISES DEPARTMENT Policy Note 2025-2026

1. Introduction

Micro, Small, and Medium Enterprises (MSMEs) serve as the backbone of the Indian economy, contributing approximately 30% to the country's Gross Domestic Product (GDP) and nearly 50% to its total exports (Role of MSMEs in the country: Press release by the Ministry of MSMEs, August 2024). These enterprises provide employment to over 25 Crore across India (MSME Dashboard, Government of India), spanning diverse sectors. As per registrations in Udyam portal, there are currently 5.8 Crore MSMEs operating in the country. These enterprises are active in all major sectors, including manufacturing, services, and trading offering products that range from commodities used in our day to


day life to advanced components used in space research.

1.1 MSMEs in Tamil Nadu

Tamil Nadu is India's most industrialized state, housing the highest number of factories with 16% of the nation's total (Invest India, Government of India). It also holds the third position in exports across the country, contributing around USD 30.50 billion, showcasing immense business potential. Tamil Nadu's MSMEs play a crucial role in driving the State's economy and supporting its aspiration of becoming a USD 1 trillion economy. With over 33 lakh Udyam registrations, Tamil Nadu ranks third in the country (Ministry of MSMEs, Government of India). Notably, 30% of the State's entrepreneurs are women, which reflects Tamil Nadu's commitment to inclusive growth and its favourable business environment.

As of 31st March 2025, the distribution of MSMEs across categories, according to Udyam, is given below:

These top 10 districts accounts for more than 50% of the Udyam registrations in the State.

The growth of MSMEs in Tamil Nadu can be attributed to aspiring entrepreneurs, workforce in the State as well as the progressive policies adopted by the Government of Tamil Nadu.

These policies are in alignment with the United Nations' Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), especially

SDG 5: To achieve gender equality and empower all women.

SDG 8: Promote sustained, inclusive and sustainable economic growth, full and productive employment and decent work for all.

SDG 9: Build resilient infrastructure, promote inclusive and sustainable industrialization and foster innovation.

1.2 Structure of the MSME Department

The organizations under the administrative control of the MSME Department and their respective functions are as follows:

1.2.1 Commissionerate of Industries and Commerce

- Facilitate policy making and dissemination of the same among stakeholders.
- Engage with MSMEs in Tamil Nadu through 38 District Industries Centres (DICs).
- Implement the schemes meant for MSMEs and disburse incentives for promoting self-employment and ensure balanced regional growth throughout the State.
- Facilitate access to credit for MSMEs through Block level, District

Level and State Level Bankers' Committees.

- Implementation of Micro Cluster Development Program.
- Facilitate the realisation of delayed payments to Micro and Small Enterprises under the MSMED Act, 2006 through Micro and Small Enterprises Facilitation Councils (MSEFCs).
- Monitor the implementation of the Tamil Nadu Business Facilitation Act, 2018 and Rules and thereby ensure speedy disposal of applications received in the Single Window Portal.
- Administration of Industrial Co-operatives.
- Formalisation of MSMEs.
- Promote exports from MSMEs.

- Encourage quality upgradation in MSMEs by incentivizing energy audit, quality certification and intellectual property filing etc.

1.2.2. Tamil Nadu Small Industries Development Corporation Limited (TANSIDCO)

- Establishment, maintenance and upgradation of Industrial Estates. This also includes assistance in the establishment of Private Industrial Estates.
- Establishment, maintenance and upgradation of Plug & Play Flatted Factory modules.
- Establishment of Common Facility Centres (CFCs) and Common Production Infrastructure Centres. This also includes the Micro Cluster Development Program (MCDP).
- Establishment of Workers' Hostels.

- Establishment of Mega Clusters.
- Other initiatives such as e-Governance, pattas to industrial plots and distribution of raw materials.

1.2.3. Tamil Nadu Small Industries Corporation Limited (TANSI)

- Manufacture and supply of wooden and steel furniture to State Government Departments and their organisations.
- Provide good quality furniture to the open market at affordable cost.

1.2.4. Entrepreneurship Development and Innovation Institute – Tamil Nadu (EDII–TN)

- Promote entrepreneurship education and self-employment across the State.
- Promote innovation among school and college students.

1.2.5. Bureau for Facilitating MSMEs of Tamil Nadu (FaMeTN)

- Facilitate MSMEs for access to credit, markets, both domestic and international, investment, skilling, sustainability and sector specific initiatives.

1.2.6. Tamil Nadu Startup and Innovation Mission (TANSIM – StartupTN)

- Provide an enabling ecosystem for startups in the State.
- Provide and facilitate financial support to startups and incubators.
- Facilitate balanced growth of the startup ecosystem.
- Link startups with mentors to benefit.

1.2.7. Tamil Nadu Coir Business Development Corporation (TANCOIR)

- Promote and develop the coir sector.
- Encouraging and developing value added Coir products thereby creating market for Coir products so as to attract the Coir market in India and abroad.
- Facilitate financial support for coir MSMEs in Tamil Nadu.
- Facilitate marketing of value added coir products.

1.2.8. Tamil Nadu Food Processing and Agriculture Export Promotion Corporation (TNAPEX)

- Encouraging the processing of agricultural produce in Tamil Nadu.
- Promoting initiatives to produce value-added products like processed food items, beverages,

and juices from agricultural produce, along with undertaking necessary developmental measures for the same.

2. COMMISSIONERATE OF INDUSTRIES AND COMMERCE

The Commissionerate of Industries and Commerce, since its inception, has been contributing to the development and growth of entrepreneurs in Tamil Nadu through various schemes and incentives. These schemes can be broadly classified into

- Self - employment and Entrepreneurship schemes; and
- Subsidies for Setting up and Expansion of Enterprises

which are in alignment with the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) of the United Nations (UN), especially,

SDG 8: Promote sustained, inclusive and sustainable economic growth, full and productive employment and decent work

for all;

SDG 9: Build resilient infrastructure, promote inclusive and sustainable industrialization and foster innovation;

SDG10: Reduce inequality within and among countries; and

SDG17: Strengthen the means of implementation and revitalize the Global Partnership for Sustainable Development.

2.1. District Industries Centres (DICs)

All 38 districts across the State have District Industries Centres, headed by a General Manager. The role of DIC is to render assistance to the aspiring entrepreneurs in identifying viable projects, preparation of project reports and obtaining licenses and clearances through the Tamil Nadu Single Window Portal. The DICs also

liaise with Banking and financial institutions for access to credit.

2.2. Self-employment and Entrepreneurship Schemes

The Commissionerate is implementing various self-employment schemes, viz.,

1. Kalaigarnar Kaivinai Thittam (KKT)
2. Annal Ambedkar Business Champions Scheme (AABCS)
3. New Entrepreneur-cum-Enterprise Development Scheme (NEEDS)
4. Unemployed Youth Employment Generation Programme (UYEGP)
5. Prime Minister's Employment Generation Programme (PMEGP) and
6. Pradhan Mantri Formalization

of Micro Food Processing Enterprises (PMFME) scheme.

The first four schemes are fully sponsored by the State Government, while the fifth scheme is funded by the Union Government and the sixth by both the Union and the State Government in the ratio of 60:40.

The self employment schemes are tailored to achieve the following targets under the UN SDGs:

SDG 8.1: Sustain per capita economic growth in accordance with national circumstances and, in particular, at least 7 per cent gross domestic product growth per annum in the least developed countries

SDG 8.3: Promote development-oriented policies that

support productive activities, decent job creation, entrepreneurship, creativity and innovation, and encourage the formalization and growth of micro, small and medium sized enterprises, including through access to financial services; and

SDG 9.3: Increase the access of small-scale industrial and other enterprises, in particular in developing countries, to financial services, including affordable credit, and their integration into value chains and markets.

2.2.1. Kalaingar Kaivina Thittam (KKT)

The Tamil Nadu Government has introduced a progressive development

Scheme for artisans in the name of “Kalaingar Kaivina Thittam” in December, 2024. This scheme comprehensively covers financial assistance and upskilling required for the development of artisans.

In the year 2024-25, 42,280 applications have been received and 23,607 applications recommended to Banks, out of which 8,552 applications involving a subsidy of Rs.32.39 Crore have been sanctioned by banks.

2.2.2. Annal Ambedkar Business Champions Scheme (AABCS)

Tamil Nadu is always at the forefront in taking initiatives for the cause of social justice and equitable development. As a testimony to this, the Government in the year 2023 launched the Annal Ambedkar Business Champions Scheme (AABCS), the one of it's kind in whole of the country to foster entrepreneurship amongst the SC/ ST communities.

The scheme conforms to SDG Target 10.2 which aims to empower and promote the social, economic and political inclusion of all, irrespective of age, sex, disability, race,

ethnicity, origin, religion or economic or other status by 2030.

During 2024-25, 1,777 SC/ST entrepreneurs benefitted under the scheme, involving a subsidy of Rs.130.33 Crore.

So far, since the launch of the scheme, a total of 3,166 beneficiaries have been provided with a subsidy of Rs.289.73 Crore involving a credit access of Rs. 570.66 Crore.

2.2.3. New Entrepreneur-cum-Enterprise Development Scheme (NEEDS)

The Government of Tamil Nadu is implementing the New Entrepreneur cum Enterprise Development Scheme (NEEDS) with an objective to assist aspiring educated youth who intends to become first-generation entrepreneurs.

Beneficiaries of the program are provided online training on Entrepreneurship Development for 15 days by the Entrepreneurship Development and Innovation Institute (EDII – TN), Chennai. Facilitation and hand-holding is also done for the beneficiaries to avail loans from financial institutions. Assistance is also provided for getting plots/sheds allotted in the industrial estates of the Tamil Nadu Small Industries Development Corporation Limited (TANSIDCO).

During 2024-25, 932 entrepreneurs benefitted under the scheme, involving a subsidy of Rs.87.54 Crore.

2.2.4. Unemployed Youth Employment Generation Programme (UYEGP)

Under this scheme subsidy is being provided to start self-employment activities by educated youth. This scheme is devised specifically for trading activities.

During 2024-25, subsidy of Rs.43.15 Crore has been released to 3,126 entrepreneurs.

2.2.5. Prime Minister's Employment Generation Programme (PMEGP)

PMEGP is a self-employment scheme of the Union Government and is being implemented through the DICs, since 2008.

During 2024-25, 3007 entrepreneurs were benefitted under the scheme, involving a subsidy of Rs.77.40 Crore.

2.2.6. Pradhan Mantri Formalization of Micro Food Processing Enterprises Scheme (PMFME)

Pradhan Mantri Formalization of Micro Food Processing Enterprises scheme is a Centrally Sponsored Scheme with a fund sharing pattern of 60:40 between the Union Government and the State Government.

Under this scheme, Tamil Nadu is allocated with a budget outlay of Rs.502.67 Crore (Both Centre and State Share) over a period of 5 years from 2020-21 to 2024-25. The Government of India has extended this scheme for one more year (i.e.,) 2025-26 upto 31.03.2026.

So far 15,232 entrepreneurs have benefitted under this scheme with loan sanctions involving a subsidy of Rs. 315.88 Crore.

2.2.7. Special initiatives under Scheme for Rehabilitation of Sanitary Workers:

The Scheme for Rehabilitation of Sanitary workers is a novel scheme which envisages eliminating manual scavenging by transforming sanitary workers into entrepreneurs through maintenance of septic tanks and sewer lines through mechanized systems under Annal Ambedkar Business Champion Scheme (AABCS) and thereby ensuring safety, dignified employment and sustainable livelihood to them.

To procure the specially fabricated jetting machine of capacities 2 KL and 6 KL by SC/ST sanitary workers, who were/are working with Chennai Metropolitan Water Supply and Sewerage Board (CMWSSB), the rate of subsidy under Annal Ambedkar Business Champion Scheme was enhanced from 35% to 50%. For other category beneficiaries, the eligibility criteria of educational qualification and age under New Entrepreneur cum Enterprise Development Scheme were relaxed and the rate of subsidy was enhanced from 25% to 40%.

Out of the total of 202 beneficiaries assisted under the scheme

- 45 beneficiaries are working as manual scavengers
- 30 beneficiaries are from SC/ST community and 15 are from other communities.

- 34 beneficiaries are legal heirs of manual scavengers
- 24 beneficiaries are from SC/ST community and 10 are from other communities.
- 123 beneficiaries are SC/ST.

Under AABCS, 177 SC/ST beneficiaries received a total subsidy of Rs.51.53 Crore, while under the NEEDS scheme, 25 beneficiaries from other communities received a subsidy of Rs.6.37 Crore.

The Hon'ble Chief Minister of Tamil Nadu has launched the scheme by handing over vehicles to 100 beneficiaries on December 6, 2024.

2.3. Subsidies for New and Existing Enterprises

In order to sustain the operations of existing MSMEs, incentives such as Capital subsidy, Low Tension Power Tariff subsidy, Payroll subsidy, Back Ended Interest subsidy,

subsidy on Stamp Duty and Registration charges, subsidy for availing Quality Certifications, etc., are being extended. These subsidies also align with the previously mentioned SDG Targets, viz., 8.1, 8.3 and 9.3.

2.3.1. Capital Subsidy

Capital Subsidy is provided to Micro, Small and Medium Enterprises on the value of plant and machinery as detailed below:

During 2024-25, a subsidy of Rs.359.99 Crore has been disbursed to 2,481 enterprises.

2.3.2. Payroll subsidy

The scheme envisages reimbursement of employer's contribution to EPF for the first three years if the unit employs more than 20 persons subject to a maximum of Rs. 24,000 per employee per annum for the following enterprises.

- New Micro manufacturing enterprises set up anywhere in the State.
- New Small and Medium Manufacturing Enterprises set up in industrially backward blocks and industrial estates.
- Small and Medium Agro-based and Food Processing Enterprises set up in any of the 388 blocks in the State.
- Reimbursement of employer's contribution to the EPF for the first three years for all MSMEs, from the

date of commencement of commercial production, if the unit has employed more than 25% of their workforce as differently abled persons, subject to a ceiling of Rs.24,000/- per differently abled person per annum.

During 2024-25, 107 enterprises have been provided a total subsidy of Rs.1.99 Crore.

2.3.3. Low Tension Power Tariff (LTPT) Subsidy

20% of the power charges paid by the Tariff IIIB - LT power consuming new Micro manufacturing enterprises and existing Micro manufacturing enterprises which are taking up substantial expansion or diversification will be reimbursed for the first 36 months from the date of commencement of production as LTPT subsidy, subject to conditions.

During 2024-25, 1076 enterprises availed the incentive, with a total subsidy of Rs. 9.61 Crore.

2.3.4. Back Ended Interest Subsidy (BEIS)

To assist new/existing MSEs in procurement of plant and machinery, a Back-Ended Interest Subsidy of 5% for term loans taken upto Rs.200 lakh under the CGTMSE scheme for a period of 5 years, subject to a maximum of Rs.20 lakh (or) a subsidy of 5% for maximum period of 5 years with a ceiling of Rs. 25 lakh for term loans taken up to Rs. 500 lakh for technology upgradation is provided.

During 2024-25, 635 enterprises availed the incentive, with a total subsidy of Rs. 3.52 Crore.

2.3.5. Subsidy for Promotion of Energy Audit and Conservation of Energy (PEACE)

PEACE encourages MSMEs to adopt energy efficiency and sustainability practices through incentives. This scheme aligns directly with the following SDG targets:

SDG 7.3: By 2030, double the global rate of improvement in energy efficiency; and

SDG 7.a: By 2030, enhance international cooperation to facilitate access to clean energy research and technology, including renewable energy, energy efficiency and advanced and cleaner fossil-fuel technology, and promote investment in energy infrastructure and clean energy technology.

Under this scheme, a subsidy of 75% on the cost of taking up energy audit is provided, subject to a maximum of Rs.1 lakh.

For implementing the recommendations of the energy audit, a subsidy of 50% of the cost of acquiring technology for energy saving and / or modification/ alteration in the existing machinery is provided, subject to a maximum of Rs.10 lakh.

During 2024-25, 256 enterprises availed the incentive, with a total subsidy of Rs.3.27 Crore.

2.3.6. Subsidy for acquiring Quality Certification (Q-CERT)

Under Q-CERT,

- 100% reimbursement of certification and consulting charges subject to a maximum of Rs.2 lakh per enterprise for

National Certifications and Rs.10 lakh per enterprise for international certifications is provided.

- Reimbursement of Quality Certification charges to the MSMEs for renewal of their existing international quality certifications, at the rate of 25% of the renewal fee, subject to a ceiling of Rs.1 lakh, provided if the enterprise have not availed Q-cert subsidy earlier for the same certification.

During 2024-25, 283 enterprises had availed the incentive for Rs.5.25 Crore.

2.3.7. Reimbursement of Stamp Duty and Registration Charges

To encourage setting up of new manufacturing Micro and Small enterprises in backward blocks, 50% on the actual value of

Stamp Duty and Registration charges is reimbursed as subsidy.

During 2024-25, 10 enterprises had availed the incentive, with a total subsidy of Rs. 0.25 Crore.

2.3.8 Subsidy for Registration of Intellectual Property Rights

To promote innovation amongst MSMEs, a minimum of Rs.1 lakh on submission of proof of patent registration (without the need for any other document), or 75% subsidy on the cost of filing of the application for Patent Registration, subject to a maximum of Rs.3.00 lakh per Patent is provided.

For Trade Mark Registration or Geographical Indications (GI), 50% subsidy on the cost of filing application for Trade Mark Registration, subject to a maximum of Rs. 25,000/- per Trade Mark or Geographical Indications registered is provided.

During 2024-25, 26 enterprises availed the incentive, with a total subsidy of Rs.0.21 Crore.

2.3.9. Scheme for Fund Raising from Capital Market

With a view to promote the participation of MSMEs on the SME Exchange, a subsidy of 75% of the expenditure incurred for listing, subject to a maximum of Rs. 30 lakh is provided for listing on the SME Exchange.

During 2024-25, 5 enterprises had availed a total subsidy of Rs.1.50 Crore.

2.4. Micro Cluster Development Programme (MCDP)

The Micro Cluster Development Programme (MCDP) was launched during 2022-23 to foster the growth of Micro and Small entrepreneurs across the State. This scheme generates rural employment besides promoting inclusive and sustainable development by providing common facility

centres, skilling in management, research and development for increased production and marketability.

The scheme is implemented by Commissionerate of Industries and Commerce and Tamil Nadu Small Industries Development Corporation.

So far, 45 project proposals for the total project cost of Rs.221.94 Crore with Government grant of Rs.177.87 Crore have been approved. Among the approved clusters, eight clusters have started functioning, nine proposals have been dropped due to various reasons and the remaining clusters are in progress.

2.5. Other Important Initiatives:

2.5.1. Tamil Nadu Single Window Portal (TNSWP)

The Tamil Nadu Single Window Portal 2.0, launched by the Hon'ble Chief Minister of Tamil Nadu in July 2021, enables investors to obtain licenses and approval from Government agencies under one roof within a specified time frame without any hassle. The portal covers more than 200 services encompassing over 40 Government departments/ agencies, at

present. This portal aims to improve Ease of Doing Business (EoDB) for investors in Tamil Nadu.

During 2024-25, out of 33,013 applications received from MSMEs, 29,035 applications have been disposed through the TNSWP.

2.5.2. Tamil Nadu Industry Database

In order to provide seamless services to MSMEs, Tamil Nadu Industry Database is being developed in coordination with FaMeTN. This will leverage on the various data available with key departments of the Government of Tamil Nadu and will assist in connecting Large Industries to MSMEs for all vendor requirements. This will also facilitate in devising focused policies for the MSMEs.

As part of the development of the Tamil Nadu Industry Database, a total of 16,64,127 records have been collected from 12 departments including Commercial Taxes, Energy, Greater Chennai Corporation,

Handicrafts, etc. Of these, 5,82,986 have been successfully mapped with Udyam Registration and action is being taken to map the remaining 10,81,141 records. The mapped data will be integrated into the upcoming mobile application for seamless access and utilization.

2.5.3. Credit Mentors and Annual Credit Plan


The Government of Tamil Nadu sets targets under the Annual Credit Plan for MSMEs. In order to facilitate access to credit for MSMEs, Credit Mentors have been appointed in each of the districts. The Credit Mentors besides assisting the entrepreneurs in availing hasslefree loans, organizes loan facilitation drives in districts.

In 2024-25, 79 credit camps were organized in which loan to the tune of

Rs.5,485.22 Crore have been facilitated to 20,580 MSMEs.

These Credit mentors under the supervision of the General Managers of District Industries Centres have achieved a credit flow of Rs.2.08 lakh Crore till December 2024 against the Annual Credit target of Rs.2.78 lakh Crore, which is 74.96%.

2.5.4. Micro and Small Enterprises Facilitation Councils(MSEFC)

The Government constituted four regional Micro and Small Enterprises

Facilitation Councils at Chennai, Tiruchirappalli, Madurai, and Coimbatore as per the provisions of the MSMED Act 2006. These Councils address and resolve issues pertaining to delayed payments to Micro and Small Enterprises on goods/services supplied/provided to the buyers.

In order to speed up the disposal of petitions filed for delayed payments, the Government has bifurcated the councils at Chennai and Madurai, thereby constituting new councils at Vellore and Thoothukudi, respectively.

During the year 2024-25, 67 MSEFC sittings were conducted and 426 cases were disposed involving an amount of Rs.72.28 Crore.

2.5.5. Tamil Nadu Global Investors Meet - 2024 (TNGIM 2024)

As part of TNGIM 2024, District Investment Conclaves were conducted across all 38 districts of Tamil Nadu through the District Industries Centers. As a result of these conclaves, 5,068 Memorandum of Understanding (MoUs) were signed attracting investments worth Rs.63,573.11 Crore.

Small enterprises have committed an investment of Rs.38,811 Crore, while Medium and Micro enterprises have committed investments worth Rs.22,609 Crore and Rs.2,152 Crore respectively. The top 3 sectors which attracted the highest investments are agro and food processing, textiles and auto components. These investments are expected to create about two lakh and fifty thousand jobs across the State.

As on 31.03.2025, 2,360 number of MoUs have commenced commercial

production with an investment of Rs.25,668.83 Crore thereby generating 91,785 number of employment out of the committed employment of 2,51,660 for 5068 MoUs.

2.6. Industrial Cooperatives

The objective of establishing Industrial Cooperative societies is to provide continuous and employment to the rural artisans, workers and laborers so as to provide them with a sustained income thereby improving their economic conditions.

262 Industrial Cooperative Societies are functioning under the administrative control of the Department of Industries and Commerce. These societies are into multifarious trades such as Coir, Labour contract, Printing, Tea, Handicrafts, Industrial Estates, Snake Catching etc., The most notable of these societies are INDCOSERVE, SAGOSERVE, Tamil Nadu

Industrial Cooperative Bank (TAICO Bank), the Irulas Snake Catchers Societies to mention a few.

The Madras District Washermen Workers Industrial Co-operative Society was revived during 2024-25 based on the request made by the erstwhile members. The society now has 25 old and 50 new members.

The Industrial Cooperative Societies achieved a turnover of Rs.1755.39 Crore during 2024-25. Out of 262 Societies, 184 societies have earned a profit of Rs.440.91 Crore. A sum of Rs.197.79 Crore was disbursed as wages to 8872 workers of all societies during 2024-25.

2.6.1. INDCOSERVE

The Tamil Nadu Small Tea Growers Industrial Cooperative Tea Factories Federation (INDCOSERVE), the largest tea

cooperative federation in the country, was established in 1965 comprising 16 Industrial Cooperative Tea Factories (ICTFs) with 23,655 members in the Nilgiris district.

The key activities undertaken by INDCOSERVE during 2024-25 are as follows:

- 10 Industrial Cooperative Tea Factories in the Nilgiris District have been modernised at a total cost of Rs.50.06 Crore with NABARD RIDF loan.
- The 20 INDCO Tea Vandis sell INDCO Branded Teas on wheels and also sell snacks, honey and gooseberries, thereby providing livelihood opportunities to the tribal communities in the hill areas.
- The “INDCO Tea Houses” which are cafeterias, serves INDCO teas and snacks to the public. 17 INDCO Tea Houses are functioning throughout Tamil Nadu.

- For the benefit of Small Tea Grower Members of Industrial Cooperative Tea Factories, 1000 Nos. of Green Leaf Harvesting Machines were purchased under Special Area Development Programme at a cost of Rs.1.37 Crore and is being provided to the members on nominal rent through the Industrial Cooperative Tea Factories.
- INDCOSERVE has earned a sum of Rs.95 lakh in 2024-25, by providing warehousing facilities for tea produced by Cooperative Tea Factories and TANTEA in its warehouses at Coonoor, Coimbatore and Kochi.
- 2679 Metric Tons of tea has been supplied to PDS shops by INDCOSERVE, in 2024-25, across Tamil Nadu, thereby generating a

revenue of Rs.60.73 Crore and earning a profit of Rs.6.01 Crore.

- In 2024-25, Nilgiris Tea Auction Centre by the sale of 100.58 MTs of Tea made through its e-auction centre has generated a revenue of Rs. 1.07 Crore and thereby making a net profit of Rs.63.19 lakh.
- 41522 MTs of Green Tea leaves were procured by 16 ICTFs from their members in 2024-25 which resulted in production of 11,059 MTs of tea and sales of Rs.130.37 Crore.

2.6.2. SAGOSERVE

The Salem Starch and Sago Manufacturers Service Industrial Cooperative Society Ltd. (known as SAGOSERVE) was established in 1981 with the objective of facilitating a fair price for the products of tapioca Sago and Starch of member-

manufacturers, by eliminating middlemen from the market and also by providing warehouse facilities and financial assistance to its members.

SAGOSERVE has obtained a Geographical Indication (GI) tag for Sago as "Salem Sago (Javvarisi)".

SAGOSERVE has engaged the services of Central Tuber Crops Research Institute, Thiruvananthapuram, for developing a "Standard Operating Procedure (SOP)" at a cost of Rs.32.76 lakh in order to produce chemical free sago. The Standard Operating Procedure has been submitted by the Central Tuber Crops Research Institute and the same will be implemented after obtaining approval of the General Body.

In order to effectively market the products of the member units of SAGOSERVE, the entity has registered a new

trademark by name “Chemical-Free Sago” on 20.12.2024.

The SAGOSERVE Laboratory is being upgraded to the standard of “FSSAI-NABL” integrated laboratory at a cost of Rs.2 Crore in order to ensure the quality of sago.

To promote the sale of sago and increase its consumption among the local people, SAGOSERVE has put up a Direct Sales Point at a cost of Rs.33.60 lakh in SAGOSERVE premises for selling sago products. The premises also houses a “Sago-Indco food court” wherein sago based food dishes are being sold to the customers.

SAGOSERVE is in the process of developing a Mobile Application in order to connect its members with tapioca farmers for purchase of tapioca tuber directly from the farmers without the intervention of

middlemen, thereby protecting the tapioca farmers from exploitation.

During 2024-25, SAGOSERVE received 14.71 lakh bags with sales turnover of Rs. 522.83 Crore and earned a net profit of Rs.3.28 Crore.

2.6.3. Tamil Nadu Industrial Cooperative Bank (TAICO Bank)

Initially, with an objective to provide financial assistance to the Industrial Cooperative societies, the Tamil Nadu Industrial Co-operative Bank (TAICO Bank) was established in 1961. TAICO Bank has since expanded its scope of financial assistance to various types of loans to individuals, MSMEs, and Government employees. The bank functions with 48 branches across the state serving more than 2 Lakh customers. Two branches are

functioning in The Nilgiris district to serve the Industrial Cooperative Tea Factories.

The TAICO Bank Branch in the premises of NLC India Ltd., serves more than 5000 NLC Industrial Co-operative Service Society members. A new branch was established in Hosur in 2024.

- TAICO Bank has upgraded its Banking facilities to its customers like RTGS, NEFT, mobile banking services and IMPS through its Core Banking Solutions.
- TAICO Bank acts as the nodal bank for Tamil Nadu PSEs on the TNTReDS Platform and has facilitated more than 1952 MSME units to avail credit facilities to the extent of Rs.4086.71 Crore from other banks and financial institutions.
- TAICO Bank has formulated various loan products after repurpose of TAICO

Bank to support the MSMEs under which loans to 2186 MSMEs to the tune of Rs.120 Crore have been sanctioned, of which Rs.40.88 Crore pertains to 2055 beneficiaries of Kalaignar Kaivina Thittam.

- TAICO Bank, during 2024-25, mobilized deposits to the tune of Rs.936.07 Crore, and earned a tentative net profit of Rs.12.25 Crore by extending loans and advances to the tune of Rs.666.50 Crore.

2.6.4. Irula Snake Catchers' Industrial Cooperative Societies:

i. Irula Snake Catchers' Industrial Cooperative Society Ltd, Chengalpattu:

The Irula Snake Catchers' Industrial Cooperative Society Ltd, Chengalpattu commenced its activities on 19.01.1979. At present, there are 339 members with a paid up share capital of Rs.37.61 lakh. The society extracts venom from the snakes and

sells it to the Research Institutions and Pharmaceutical labs for manufacturing anti-venom for snake bites.

The main objective of the society is to provide continuous employment and thereby improving the socio-economic status of the Irula members.

In order to ensure employment and improve the livelihood of the members of the society, the trapping charges were revised in the year 2022.

This charges was revised and enhanced from July 2024. Correspondingly the sale price of the snake venom to the pharmaceutical companies has also been enhanced during the month of February 2025 as detailed below:

During the last four years from 2021-2022 to 2024-2025 Irula Snake Catchers' Industrial Cooperative Society sold 2406.15 gram venom and earned a revenue of Rs.8.21 Crore. During the year 2024-25, this society sold 599 gms of venom for Rs. 2.77 Crore.

ii. Tiruvannamalai District Irula Snake Catchers Livelihood Industrial Cooperative Society:

The Tiruvannamalai District Irula Snake Catchers Livelihood Industrial

Cooperative Society was registered in 2018 and functions with 181 members with a paid-up share capital of Rs.0.18 lakh. The functions of the society is similar to that of the society in Chengalpattu.

During the year 2024-25, Tiruvannamalai Irula Snake Catchers Livelihood Industrial Cooperative Society sold 19 gms of venom for Rs.5.82 lakh to various Laboratories and Testing Centres.

2.7. Technical Training Institutions:

2.7.1. Central Electrical Testing Laboratory (CETL)

The Central Electrical Testing Laboratory (CETL), Kakkalur is functioning under the control of the Industries Commissioner since 1973. It is accredited by National Accreditation Board for Testing and Calibration Laboratories (NABL), a Constituent Board under the Quality Council of India and recognised by Bureau of Indian Standards (BIS), Ministry of Consumer Affairs, Government of India.

CETL offers a 2 day training programme in testing of electrical products in which 507 personnel from various organizations have undergone training.

During the year 2024-25 CETL earned a revenue of Rs.62.47 lakh by testing 1499 samples.

2.7.2. Chemical Laboratories

The Chemical Wing of the Commissionerate comprises of 5 Regional Testing Laboratories at Chennai, Madurai, Coimbatore, Salem and Thoothukudi for testing industrial raw materials and finished products. These laboratories provide testing facilities to cater to the needs of Micro, Small and Medium Enterprises, Government Departments like Public Works Department, Railways, Corporations and private customers for testing their raw materials and finished products. These testing laboratories are equipped with modern instruments such as the Optical Emission Spectrometer and the Atomic

Absorption Spectrometer which can test the chemical composition of metals to high level of accuracy. These laboratories are also equipped with other instruments to test materials used in construction industries such as steel rods, cement, water, sand, aggregates, bitumen, soil etc.

During 2024-25, these laboratories earned a revenue of Rs.3.90 Crore by testing 1,02,871 samples.

2.7.3. The Chennai Industrial Co-operative Analytical Laboratory Ltd. (MICAL)

The Chennai Industrial Co-operative Analytical Laboratory Limited (MICAL) was established in 1964 as a cooperative laboratory, headquartered in Chennai with an ISO certified branch in Coonoor. It offers analysis and testing of raw materials and finished products manufactured by pharmaceutical enterprises. The Society is in the process of obtaining NABL accreditation.

During 2024-25, MICAL tested 2410 samples earning a revenue of Rs.26.98 lakh.

2.7.4. Technical Training Institutions

The following Technical Training Institutions are functioning under the Commissionerate:

- i) The Institute of Ceramic Technology, Vridhachalam which offers a 3½ years Diploma Course in Ceramic Technology.
- ii) Government Technical Training Centre, Guindy, Chennai which offers 3 years diploma in Mechanical Engineering in Tool & Die and Refrigeration & Air conditioning.
- iii) The Institute of Tool Engineering, Dindigul which offers 3 years Diploma in Tool and Die.
- iv) The Government Scientific Glass Training Centre, Coimbatore which

offers training in tabletop glass blowing process.

- v) Government Production Centre for Scientific Glass Apparatus, Coimbatore which manufactures laboratory glassware.

2.8. TAMIL NADU COIR BUSINESS DEVELOPMENT CORPORATION (TANCOIR)

Tamil Nadu Coir Business Development Corporation (TANCOIR), established in 2022, is dedicated to driving inclusive and sustainable growth in the State's coir sector. Through targeted initiatives and schemes, TANCOIR focuses on promoting value-addition and quality manufacturing among coir MSMEs.

2.8.1. Coir Policy Implementation

The Tamil Nadu Coir Policy 2024, launched by the Hon'ble Chief Minister of Tamil Nadu on January 04, 2024, aims to promote the growth of coir enterprises and

enhance value addition in coir products. Since its release, TANCOIR has aligned its objectives and actions with the policy.

As per Section 3.1.1 of the policy, which emphasizes the promotion of coir products in government departments, TANCOIR has facilitated the supply of:

- 1.06 lakh sq. m. of coir geotextiles for rural road subgrade strengthening over 21.84 km.
- 32,200 sq. m. of coir geotextiles for bund strengthening in pond rejuvenation projects.
- 2.02 lakh sq. m. of coir geotextiles for highway embankment slope strengthening, benefiting projects within and outside Tamil Nadu.
- Coir mattings worth Rs.40 lakh for 18 temples across the state, enhancing pilgrim pathways.

- 49,000 sq. m. of coir geotextiles for slope strengthening and erosion control at Manjalar Dam, Theni District.

In line with Section 3.1.2 of Coir policy, TANCOIR has conducted six domestic buyer-seller meets and one international buyer-seller meet, generating business opportunities worth Rs.3.06 Crore.

Further, under Section 3.1.7, which focuses on market access for coir MSMEs, TANCOIR has facilitated 434 business orders worth Rs.21.34 crore since its inception, supporting both domestic and international markets.

2.8.2. Coir Cluster Development

TANCOIR is facilitating coir cluster development as envisioned in section 3.2.4 of the coir policy. The Government of Tamil Nadu has initiated the establishment of six coir clusters at Kundadam, K. Paramathy, Peravurani, Udumalaipet, Pollachi, and

Watrap, with a total project cost of Rs.51.08 Crore, supported by a government subsidy of Rs.37.81 Crore.

TANCOIR serves as the implementing agency for the coir clusters at Kundadam and K. Paramathy, with a combined project cost of Rs.20.88 Crore and a government subsidy of Rs.13.75 Crore. These two clusters are expected to generate approximately 370 direct and indirect employment opportunities and are scheduled to become fully operational by June, 2025.

2.8.3. Government subsidy schemes specific to coir MSMEs

A dedicated subsidy scheme has been introduced for Coir sector for establishing concrete drying yards, greenhouse dryers, mechanical dryers, and effluent treatment plants (ETPs) to enhance product quality, prevent adulteration, and mitigate pollution.

To date, 14 coir MSMEs have filed subsidy claims worth Rs. 2.66 Crore.

On June 28, 2024, the government announced a new scheme providing 25% subsidy to coir exporters on the cost incurred for product testing

The government also announced for the establishment of an Export Facilitation Centre at Pollachi on June 28, 2024, to cater to the specific needs of coir MSMEs.

2.8.4. Other Initiatives:

TANCOIR also assists and supports the coir MSMEs through the following interventions:-

1. During the Agri Intex Expo that happened on July 2024, 5 coir MSMEs were facilitated to participate in the expo for free generating sales of Rs.27.93 lakh.
2. In total, 26 MSMEs have been facilitated to participate in 8 different

domestic expos generating a sales revenue worth Rs.1.57 Crore for the MSMEs.

3. Fulfilling the objectives of section 3.3.6 and section 3.5 of the Tamil Nadu Coir Policy 2024, TANCOIR has conducted 22 training and workshop programs, benefitting a total of 525 coir MSMEs.

2.9. Tamil Nadu Food Processing and Agri Export Promotion Corporation (TNAPEX):

Introduction

The Tamil Nadu Food Processing and Agri Export Promotion Corporation (TNAPEX) was established to promote investments, bridge industry gaps, and implement innovative initiatives for the growth of Tamil Nadu's food processing and agricultural export sectors. It offers a wide range of services, including reducing post-harvest losses, supporting food processing businesses, boosting exports of agricultural and value-

added products, optimizing the use of post-harvest infrastructure, and positioning Tamil Nadu as a leader in food processing in India.

2.9.1. Activities carried out by TNAPEX for the year 2024-25:

i) Outreach Programmes

TNAPEX has organised 61 outreach programmes such as e-commerce workshops, B2B events, stakeholder meetings, investor conclaves, export trainings for farmers, FPOs, Food Business Operators and new investors. These programmes have reached more than 5,000 beneficiaries. As a result, over 50 farmers and entrepreneurs have been onboarded to e-commerce platforms, and more than 100 enterprises have been connected with buyers.

In addition to these initiatives, TNAPEX has participated in three of the exhibitions held outside Tamil Nadu such as Biofach India, Indusfood and World Food India. Further TNAPEX has participated in events like Food

Pro, Startup Thiruvizha, Agri and Food Growth Summit, World Diaspora Day Expo etc., in Tamil Nadu. Through these events, TNAPEX has showcased Tamil Nadu's potential in food processing and attracted international buyers interested in sourcing processed food products from the state. Further, 42 MSMEs exhibited their products at the TNAPEX pavilions, generating purchase orders worth Rs.3 Crore and opening avenues for these MSMEs in the international arena.

ii) Agri Value Chain

TNAPEX has initiated to create value chains for Rice, Mango, Banana, Guava, Tomato, Chilli and Fish products, including verticals like production, post-harvest management, processing, branding and marketing. In Phase -1 of this initiative, value chains for Chilli in Ramanathapuram District and Banana in Theni District are being created at a cost of Rs.1.25 Crore.

iii) Sector Transformation: Food Processing Sector under RAMP (Raising and Accelerating MSME Performance)

A Project Management Unit (PMU) has been established under the TNAPEX to coordinate, implement, and monitor the Food Processing under Sector Transformation under RAMP projects. TNAPEX has conducted 12 workshops on export promotion and product development for MSMEs in various districts. Additionally, a regional hub has been set up as a Centre of Excellence for Agri-Tech and an export enablement centre in Trichy under the RAMP initiative.

iv) Food Testing Labs

An advanced food testing laboratory for promoting exports is proposed to be established by TNAPEX at an estimated cost of Rs.11.43 Crore in Madurai.

v) Moringa Export Facilitation Centre

The Moringa Export Facilitation Centre functioning under TNAPEX has provided

technical support in the creation of an export oriented moringa processing unit in Tirunelveli District. This unit was connected with 30 moringa farmers for raw material supply. The unit is operating for the last 6 months and has exported more than 6 MT of moringa leaf powder to various countries. These efforts will be continued through the TNAPEX-Moringa Special Export Facilitation Centre in the coming years also.

Nearly 200 outreach programs, field visits, farmer connect meetings were conducted benefiting more than 8000 farmers.

To facilitate export of moringa based value added products from Tamil Nadu, cluster level common infrastructure facilities will be established as Hub and Spokes Model covering 9 districts of Moringa Export Zone namely, Dindigul, Karur, Theni, Tiruppur, Ariyalur, Thoothukudi, Thirunelveli, Cuddalore and Madurai.

vi) TNAPEX-Food Processing Infrastructure App

TNAPEX has developed a comprehensive repository of agro and food processing infrastructures across the state. To facilitate easy access for farmers and stakeholders, a mobile app has been developed. This initiative is designed to enhance efficiency and productivity in agro and food processing by providing convenient access to essential resources and infrastructures.

vii) TN Food Business Accelerator Program

TNAPEX has signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) with NABARD (National Bank for Agriculture and Rural Development) to equip young entrepreneurs in rural Tamil Nadu with the required skill sets to come out successful in the food processing industry. NABARD has offered Rs.70.00 lakh to provide Entrepreneurship training to 120 youth of the Delta districts.

viii) Promotion of Food Parks

TNAPEX has organised six Investors' conclaves in Chennai, Trichy, Madurai, Coimbatore, Karur and Tirunelveli to promote the three mega food parks being developed by SIPCOT in Theni, Manapparai, and Tindivanam. These events saw participation of 700 individuals and entrepreneurs with about 30 of them expressing interest in investing in the mega food parks.

ix) Other Initiatives

- TNAPEX has launched a program called Business Incubation Training Scholar (TNAPEX – BITS), wherein, youth will be trained in food processing industries and start the same. So far 25 individuals have been identified to undergo this training.
- TNAPEX has applied for Geographical Indication (GI) registration for the following unique and traditional products of Tamil Nadu:

- Chettinadu: Kai Murukku and Seedai
- Ramanathapuram (Ramnad): Palmyra Sugar Crystals
- Kovilpatti: Seeval
- Ramanathapuram (Ramnad): Pattarai Karuvadu (Dry Fish)

3. TAMIL NADU SMALL INDUSTRIES DEVELOPMENT CORPORATION (TANSIDCO)

Introduction

The Tamil Nadu Small Industries Development Corporation (TANSIDCO) was established in the year 1970 as a public sector undertaking with the specific motive to promote the development by providing quality infrastructure to the Micro, Small and Medium Enterprises (MSMEs) in Tamil Nadu. TANSIDCO activities are aimed at supporting the development and sustainable growth of micro, small and medium enterprises, through:

- Establishment, maintenance and upgradation of Industrial Estates. This also includes assistance in the establishment of Private Industrial Estates.

- Establishment, maintenance and upgradation of Plug & Play Flatted Factory modules.
- Establishment of Common Facility Centres (CFCs) and Common Production Infrastructure Centres. This also includes the Micro Cluster Development Programme (MCDP).
- Establishment of Workers' Hostels.
- Establishment of Mega Clusters.
- Other initiatives such as e-Governance and distribution of raw materials.

These infrastructure development initiatives of TANSIDCO align to **SDG Target 9.2:** Promote inclusive and sustainable industrialization and by 2030, significantly raise industry's share of employment and gross domestic product, in line with national circumstances and double its share in least developed countries.

3.1. Industrial Estates

One of TANSIDCO's key activities is to establish Industrial Estates across the State to support the land needs of entrepreneurs. By providing such lands, TANSIDCO aids in the overall balanced regional industrial development of Tamil Nadu.

At the Commencement of last year, TANSIDCO was managing 41 Government Industrial Estates and 89 TANSIDCO Industrial Estates developed in 8709.15 acres of land across the State with 15251 Industrial Plots/Sheds. TANSIDCO committed to develop new Industrial Estates with quality infrastructure for the balanced industrial ecosystem has established 5 New Industrial Estates in 5 Districts during the year 2024-25 and the same was inaugurated by the Hon'ble Chief Minister on 25.03.2025.

At present, TANSIDCO maintains 135 Industrial Estates spread over 8878.74 acres with 15542 industrial plots/sheds. Details of 135 Industrial Estates are given in Annexure-1. In the financial year 2024-25, the TANSIDCO has achieved a total sales of Rs. 108.66 crore from the sale of Industrial Estates plots and made a profit of Rs. 22.10 crore.

3.2. Establishment of New Industrial Estates

With a view to aid for the growth of industrialisation across the State, during 2024-25, 6 New Industrial Estates are under development in 5 districts at a total project cost of Rs. 209.39 crore, in a total extent of 239.54 acres. The details of the Industrial Estates are as under:-

TANSIDCO supports MSME Associations who come forward to establish Private Industrial Estates with a grant of 50% of the total project value not exceeding Rs.15 crore. During 2023-24, the minimum land area requirement for the same was reduced from 50 acres to 10 acres to assist more beneficiaries.

3.6. Shifting of existing private Industrial units to the outskirts of a town/city

Government of Tamil Nadu introduced special incentive for the group of units ready to shift their establishment outside the town/urban areas and to set up New Industrial Estate on their own with infrastructure facilities viz. roads, water, electricity, conference hall and other common facilities. The incentive is provided at 75% of the total cost of development of the estate excluding land cost subject to a maximum of Rs.20 Crore.

During 2023-24, the land area requirement was reduced from 10 acres to 2 acres owing to the increased land cost and difficulty in identifying large area of land.

Under this scheme, one private estate M/s. East Coast Automobile Services Pvt Ltd., is being developed for shifting in Cuddalore District, at a total project cost of Rs.4.39 crore with grant assistance of Rs.3.29 crore and the project is under implementation.

3.7. Plug and Play Flatted Factory Complexes

Plug and Play Flatted Factory Complexes provide MSMEs with readymade infrastructure for manufacturing and assembly. These complexes cater to a wide variety of MSMEs across Tamil Nadu. The following Flatted Factory Complexes were developed by TANSIDCO:

3.7.1. Gold Jewellery Park

During the year 2024-25, Hon'ble Chief Minister has announced to establish Gold Jewellery Park (7 storied Plug and Play Flatted Factory Complex) at Kurichi Industrial Estate in Coimbatore District at a project cost of Rs.126.12 crore. The project work is under progress and will be completed by the end of year 2026.

3.8. Common Facility Centres (CFCs)

To enhance the productivity and competitiveness of the MSMEs, Common Facility Centres are developed by TANSIDCO. These CFCs can be used by MSMEs for their value addition and assembly requirements and is currently implemented under the MSE-CDP scheme. So far, TANSIDCO has completed 36 CFC projects out of 48 projects sanctioned, at a total project cost of Rs.255.39 crore. The balance 12 projects are under

implementation, which includes the following 3 CFCs projects approved during 2024-25.

- Coir Rope & Padding Cluster, Anjukuli patti, Dindigul District
- Leather Cluster, Pallavaram, Chengalpattu District
- Print lam Cluster, Gunduperumbedu, Kancheepuram District

Through this, Tamil Nadu stands first in India in the implementation of the MSE-CDP scheme.

In Precision Mega Cluster, Phase I work completed with the setting up of Engineering Design Centre, Re-Engineering Lab, Additive Manufacturing Centre, Advanced Testing Lab, Industry Ready Training Centre and Facility Centre for Pattern Registration & Trade Mark Registration and it was inaugurated by Hon'ble Chief Minister on 22.11.2024 for the benefit of MSMEs.

In Pharma Mega Cluster, the development of basic infrastructure facilities like Roads, Drain, Water Supply arrangements are under progress. Out of 46 Industrial Plots 43 plots were allotted to Pharma formulation units.

Developed plots/ sheds/modules in TANSIDCO's Industrial Estates are being allotted on outright sale/ lease/ rental basis to MSMEs by advertising the details of vacant plots/ sheds/modules in the official website of TANSIDCO. On receipt of application requesting allotment of plots/ sheds/modules, a Screening Committee meeting is convened to select eligible applicants. In case there are a high number of eligible applicants, the allotment is done through drawing of lots in the

presence of applicants.

To facilitate the MSMEs to commence production early, interim loan is arranged for purchase of TANSIDCO plots/ sheds under the Industrial Infrastructure Initiative Scheme (IIIS) of Tamil Nadu Industrial Investment Corporation (TIIC); and the Flexi Loan for Your MSME (FLY - MSME) of the Tamil Nadu Industrial Co-operative Bank (TAICO Bank).

3.13.2. e-Governance initiatives

TANSIDCO has computerised its operations to provide faster and efficient services to MSMEs. Under this, the following initiatives have been completed and are in use:

- TANSIDCO's Geographic Information System (GIS) has been integrated with the Government of India's "Indian Industrial Information System

(IIS) and the Indian Industrial Land Bank (IILB) web portal.

- With a view to provide prompt services to the Industrial Estate allottees, and to disseminate information about the services/schemes offered by TANSIDCO, a website has been designed: www.tansidco.tn.gov.in. Further, the online application system for plot allotment has been integrated with Tamil Nadu Single Window Portal and following online e-services are being provided to MSMEs:
 - ❖ View vacant industrial plots online.
 - ❖ View Geographical Information System (GIS) of Industrial Estate layouts.

- ❖ File and track applications online for allotment of plots / sheds/ modules.
- ❖ Make electronic payments for application fees, plot cost payment etc.,
- ❖ Download allotment order anytime, anywhere.
- ❖ Updates through SMS & E-mail Notifications.
- ❖ Issue of NOC for availing financial assistance from Banks/ Financial Institutions
- ❖ Issue of NOC for TANGEDCO connection
- ❖ Request for water connection
- ❖ To apply for sale deed
- ❖ Transfer of plot/ shed

- ❖ Issue of NOC to lease the plot/shed (or its transfer)
 - ❖ Apply for change in company constitution/ company name/ line of activity
 - ❖ Other services (Differ from above)
- The allottees are also being provided with unique login credentials to login and make plot cost payment, along with options to view dues pending and last dates for payment.
 - To address the grievances of allottees and Industrial Estates Associations quickly, a separate e-mail ID (grievanceredressal@tansidco.org) has been created.
 - From 2024-25, along with the above services, entrepreneurs seeking to get allotment of industrial plots/sheds

in TANSIDCO Industrial Estates will be able to identify the vacant industrial plots/sheds on the industrial estate map by colour coding while applying online. This will facilitate easy application with just a click. Further, additional the facility has been provided for applicants to know how many entrepreneurs have applied for a particular vacant industrial plots/sheds while applying for a industrial plots/sheds.

- In addition to the above services, accounting software with audit trail is also being developed.

3.13.3. Patta for Industrial plots

41 Industrial Estates formed by Government have been transferred to TANSIDCO and 89 Industrial Estates formed by TANSIDCO through transfer of

land / alienation / land acquisition from Government and other ways. The classification of these lands are recorded in the revenue records as Sarkar Poramboke in most Industrial Estates and as Ryotwari in a few Industrial Estates. Therefore, the following measures have been taken to resolve the difficulty faced by MSMEs in obtaining patta for lands.

To address this issue, Government has formed an empowered committee headed by the Chief Secretary to change the classification of the land from Sarkar Poramboke to Ryotwari lands. As a result, so far the classification of 1937.37 acres of Government Poramboke land has been changed as Ryotwari land in 23 Government Industrial Estates and 21 SIDCO Industrial Estates. As on date, 3384 unit holders have been issued with NOC for getting patta easily and 1430 allottees

benefited by obtaining the Patta for their industrial plots.

3.13.4 Distribution of Raw Material

Raw materials like Tamil Nadu Newsprint Ltd. (TNPL) Paper are procured and distributed to Micro and Small Enterprises based on their requirements, through 20 Branch Offices of TANSIDCO, across the State. During 2024-25, 103.14 MTs of TNPL paper was sold for a total value of Rs.92.17 lakhs, under the Raw Material Assistance scheme.

4. TAMIL NADU SMALL INDUSTRIES CORPORATION LIMITED (TANSI)

4.1. Formation

Tamil Nadu Small Industries Corporation (TANSI) was formed in the year 1965 to cater to the various engineering needs of Government Departments. It started its operations with 64 production and sales units having an asset base of Rs.668.612 lakhs.

4.2. Mission

Innovative, design, produce and supply quality goods at reasonable price to the end customers within the prescribed timeline.

4.6. Construction of Multistoried Plug and Play industrial units

In pursuance of the announcement made by the Hon'ble Minister during 2023-24, tenders were invited by TANSIDCO to construct 200 plug and play Industrial Units inside Guindy Industrial Estate with 2 lakhs Sq.ft of built up area over 3.08 Acres of TANSI land for the value of Rs.63 Crores (only for construction). The construction work is under progress and so far, Rs.18.15 Crores has been spent.

4.7. E-Commerce

TANSI has registered itself during December 2022 on GeM portal for purchase of input materials and sale of goods produced. Sale of goods worth Rs.1.22 crore has been achieved since inception.

4.8. Enterprise Resource Planning (ERP)

ERP software has been installed in TANSI at a cost of Rs.67.00 lakh and is fully operational to manage all day to day activities of TANSI which includes modules of Marketing, Order Management, Procurement, Production, Sales and Bill passing. Module on accounting is under process.

4.9. CSR initiative

- Furniture, worth Rs.3.04 crore were supplied to Tamil Nadu Skill Development Corporation under 'Naan Mudalvan' scheme surpassing our CSR commitment.
- Rs.1 crore was given as Grant to Tamil Nadu Coir Business Development Corporation as a goodwill gesture to support Tamil Nadu Coir Sector.

5. ENTREPRENEURSHIP DEVELOPMENT AND INNOVATION INSTITUTE – TAMIL NADU (EDII-TN)

Entrepreneurship Development and Innovation Institute (EDII-TN) was established in 2001 by the Government of Tamil Nadu as a not-for-profit society under the Department of Micro, Small, and Medium Enterprises (MSME), Government of Tamil Nadu. Its primary objective is to promote and develop the entrepreneurship and innovation ecosystem in the State.

EDII-TN's key activities include conducting training programs in collaboration with various Government Departments, conducting self-financing Training Programs, promoting innovation and providing business facilitation services. It fosters an entrepreneurial ecosystem by training both budding and existing entrepreneurs. EDII-TN also supports the

establishment of incubation centers and organises hackathons for school and college students to nurture Entrepreneurship and Innovation skills.

Since its inception, EDII-TN has trained more than 3.35 lakh entrepreneurs through various programs, catering to a diverse clientele including students, existing and aspiring MSME entrepreneurs and startups. In the last four years, awareness programs were conducted on Entrepreneurship and Innovation to 22 lakh school students and 9.11 lakh college students through School Innovation Development Project and Innovation and Entrepreneurship Development Program respectively.

Vision

To promote an aspirational and inclusive culture of entrepreneurship and business innovation across Tamil Nadu,

EDII TN would act as the state's resource hub for education, training and research on entrepreneurship and innovation.

Strategies

EDII-TN promotes aspirational and inclusive culture of entrepreneurship and innovation across Tamil Nadu through the following strategies: -

- Building competencies for entrepreneurs and aspiring youth.
- Supporting ecosystem for entrepreneurs including technology startups.
- Embedding entrepreneurship in the formal education system.
- Partnering with all Government and non-Government entities to develop an entrepreneurship and innovation ecosystem.

- Conducting Hackathon Programs in schools and colleges to promote innovation.

Entrepreneurship promotion is being carried out through Entrepreneurship Development Program (EDP), Awareness trainings and Certificate course. Innovation and Entrepreneurship Development Program (IEDP), School Innovation Development Project (SIDP), Innovation and Incubation program and Innovation Voucher Program (IVP) are implemented to foster Innovation. EDII-TN has empaneled 376 resource persons from different domains to provide training on various subjects.

Information and Communication Technology (ICT) is used to create, spread awareness and to promote the activities of EDII-TN.

5.1. Entrepreneurship Development Programs (EDP)

Entrepreneurship Development Programs are conducted in convergence with various Government departments and also on a self-financing basis. EDP Training on various topics such as business opportunity identification, market analysis, business plan and business models, strength, weakness, opportunities and Challenges (SWOC Analysis), Taxation, risk management and legal requirements for enterprises are covered.

5.1.1. Entrepreneurship Development Programs – (Convergence)

Entrepreneurship Development training programs are implemented through convergence with Government departments and organizations like Tamil Nadu Adi-Dravidar Housing and Development Corporation Limited

(TAHDCO), Vaazhndhu Kaattuvom Project (VKP), Tamil Nadu State Rural Livelihood Mission (TNSLRM), Tamilnadu State Urban Livelihood Mission (TNULM), Pradhan Mantri Formalisation of Micro Food Processing Enterprises Scheme and Tamil Nadu Urban Habitat Board (TNUHB). In the financial year 2024-25, 30318* beneficiaries have been given training at a cost of Rs.1021 lakhs through the above programs.

The goal of EDII's Hackathon (Niral Thiruvizha) is to foster a spirit of innovation among college students and give them the skills they need to use technology to address difficult problems in today's world. This gives them a sense of entrepreneurial ambition, enhances their abilities, and motivates them

to launch enterprises that generate employment opportunities.

“Tamil Nadu Student Innovators” (TNSI) scheme under the Innovation and Entrepreneurship Development Program (IEDP), from 2023–24, has been renamed as EDII's Hackathon.

Objectives of EDII's Hackathon

- To produce a creative minded, socially conscious and growth driven young generation.
- To find and deliver technological solutions to local problems through innovation.
- To facilitate registration of more trademarks and intellectual property rights in Tamil Nadu.
- To boost Tamil Nadu's economy by identifying new job avenues with aim to reach one trillion-dollar economy by 2030.

5.2.2. School Innovation Development Project (SIDP)

EDII-TN is implementing the School Innovation Development Project (SIDP) from the academic year 2022-23 in collaboration with the Department of School Education and United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF).

The SIDP is being implemented for students from 6th to 12th standard studying in Government and Government-aided high and higher secondary schools in 38 districts of Tamil Nadu. United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF) as a knowledge partner, provided technical assistance, video-based curriculums for innovative thinking in Tamil and English along with the capacity building to all the stakeholders including teachers and EDII District Program Managers.

Objectives

- To expose school students to the cycle of innovation and promote

the culture of entrepreneurship.

- To inspire students to solve real life problems by using simple design thinking process as a method to innovate, collaborate and obtain leadership cum entrepreneurship skills.
- To build the capacity of the teaching community to play a vital role in building an entrepreneurial and innovation ecosystem in schools and to be mentors to the evolving minds.

- In the current year, 9.40 lakh school students have been given awareness on Entrepreneurship and Innovation Students (2024-25).

teams were awarded a cash prize of Rs.10,000/- each.

- For the year 2024-25, the top teams will be selected for the finals and will be awarded cash prizes ranging from Rs.10,000/- to Rs.1 lakh.

5.2.3. Innovation Voucher Program (IVP)

Innovation Voucher Program (IVP) is a unique State Government initiative to promote research and innovation among MSMEs/Start-ups in sectors like agriculture, horticulture, veterinary, fisheries, engineering, waste management, health, automobiles, nano-technology, electronics etc. The selection process is done by the screening committee at the State level to support innovative ideas with grant upto Rs. 2 lakh under **Voucher A** for converting innovative ideas into a working prototype

and upto Rs.5 lakhs under **Voucher B** for support in commercialisation of the product.

During the financial year 2024-25, 84 innovators have been provided financial assistance of Rs.215.06 Lakh. Since inception of IVP, 520 innovators have been benefited with an amount of Rs.1337 lakh in sectors like agriculture, health, manufacturing, food processing, energy, water and sanitation etc.,

5.2.4. Incubation Centres - Tamil Nadu Manufacturing Business Incubation Infrastructure Development Program:

Promotion of technology-based entrepreneurship is one of the focus areas for EDII-TN. Various services such as co-working space, workshops, awareness programs, seed fund facilitation, networking and consulting services, support for intellectual property rights are being offered at the incubation centres.

So far, the incubation centres have supported 970 incubatees in various domains and 81973 entrepreneurs have been benefited through various awareness and training programs. A revenue of Rs.460.36 lakh has been generated by the 9 incubation centres.

5.3. Certificate Course on Entrepreneurship and Innovation

To provide an enhanced understanding of Entrepreneurship and the overall entrepreneurial landscape of Tamil Nadu to aspiring Entrepreneurs of the State, the Entrepreneurship Development and Innovation Institute (EDII-TN) in collaboration with EDII Ahmedabad has

started a one-year certification course on Entrepreneurship and Innovation from November 11, 2024, at EDII TN campus. This certificate course will be the first step for scaling up the institute as an academy of excellence for entrepreneurship. In the Next financial Year, it is envisaged to enroll 100 students for the Certificate Program.

Curriculum and Instruction

EDII-TN is delivering the program based on a comprehensive curriculum developed by EDII Ahmedabad. The course is being taught by a diverse faculty, including experts from both EDII Ahmedabad and EDII- TN, certified trainers, internal staff, and specialized professionals. All sessions are meticulously planned, tracked, and approved by the Director, EDII-TN ensuring a structured and effective learning process.

Practical Learning and Engagement:

The first semester emphasizes experiential learning, including visits to the following seven prominent incubation centers: Anna Incubator, Centre for Entrepreneurship, Golden Jubilee Biotech Park, IIT Pravartak Research Park, Crescent Incubation Innovation Council, IIT-M Centre of Excellence, Forge Innovation Incubation and Fab Lab and TN Rise. Students documented their experiences through detailed reports and gained practical knowledge on topics like UDAYAM registration and incubation processes.

5.4. Infrastructure of EDII-TN

EDII-TN has state-of-the-art infrastructure for training and the development of entrepreneurial activities on campus, featuring seven training halls with a seating capacity of 250. EDII TN also

provides these training halls on a rental basis to government organizations and MSMEs for organizing various training programs.

EDII- TN has developed a web portal for the seamless registration of candidates for various training programs conducted and to know about the schemes of EDII. Social media activities have been strengthened for spreading information, knowledge and communication on the programs implemented by EDII-TN.

5.5. Intellectual Property Facilitation Centre (IPFC)

The Tamil Nadu Intellectual Property Facilitation Centre was set up in the year 2024 at Entrepreneurship Development and Innovation Institute (EDII-TN) Campus to Support Innovators in Protecting their Intellectual Rights by mentoring and providing legal guidance for filing IPR.

Services Provided:

- Conduct awareness programs on IPR, including patents, copyrights, trademarks, and industrial designs.
- Assist MSMEs, innovators, and EDII beneficiaries with patent searches, filing, and registrations.
- Facilitate the filing of applications at the Indian Patent Office (IPO).

6. Bureau for Facilitating MSMEs of Tamil Nadu (FaMeTN)

The MSMEs in Tamil Nadu are in need of support in key areas such as finance, market access (including exports), skilling, investments, regulatory approvals and technology adoption. To address these needs, Bureau for Facilitating MSMEs of Tamil Nadu (FaMeTN) was established with an objective of facilitating MSMEs in the State by collaborating with various organizations, industry associations and government departments, to ensure they get access to the required services.

The major activities and initiatives of FaMeTN during 2024 – 25 are as follows;

6.1. Access to Credit Facilities

A. Formalised Credit: Tamil Nadu Credit Guarantee Scheme (TNCGS)

The Tamil Nadu Credit Guarantee Scheme (TNCGS) was launched in the year 2022, to improve access to formalised credit for Micro and Small Enterprises. The scheme, while operating with the extant Credit Guarantee Trust for Micro and Small Enterprises (CGTMSE) of the Government of India, provides 90% guarantee coverage for collateral free loans up to Rs.40 lakh and up to 80% guarantee for loans above Rs.40 lakh to Rs.2 Crore. TNCGS also provides Standalone guarantee coverage of 90% for loans upto Rs.40 lakh for manufacturing enterprises.

Under the TNCGS scheme, guarantees have been extended for loans amounting to Rs.7,549.95 Crore in

collaboration with CGTMSE in 2024-25 to over 42,000 MSEs including over 12,800 women, 1700 SC/ ST and 57 Differently Abled entrepreneurs.

B. Tamil Nadu Trade Receivables and Discounting System (TNTReDS)- A Mechanism for Expediting the Receivables

To address the issue of delayed payments to MSME vendors by the State Public Sector Enterprises, TNTReDS was launched in the year 2022, in which 99 Tamil Nadu State Public Sector Entities and 1,952 MSME vendors have been onboarded. In the year 2024-25, invoices worth Rs.4,092 Crore were discounted under TNTReDS benefitting 1,329 MSMEs.

6.2. Access to Markets

MSMEs, especially Micro and Small entities face difficulties in reaching out to the

market due to limited visibility and lack of exposure to domestic and international markets. This makes it difficult for them to scale new heights and succeed in today's fast-changing eco-system. To help them overcome this challenge, FaMeTN supports MSMEs by providing them opportunities to connect with potential customers. This includes facilitating participation in trade fairs and exhibitions, sponsorships, onboarding e-commerce platforms, connecting with large industries through Business to Business (B2B) networks, and expanding into international markets through exports. These efforts are aimed at helping MSMEs grow, thrive, and compete more effectively.

A. Government E-Marketplace (GeM)

Tamil Nadu ranks 4th in the country, with 76,866 MSEs registered on the GeM platform. To further augment procurement

from Tamil Nadu based MSEs and increase their registrations, FaMeTN conducted a GeM workshop for officials from various Departments. Additionally, district-wise onboarding sessions were organized across six regions viz., Madurai, Chennai, Thoothukudi, Trichy, Coimbatore and Salem resulting in the successful onboarding of 421 MSEs. It is planned to continue this onboarding sessions so as to increase the numbers.

B. Bridging the Market gaps: Trade Fairs & Exhibitions and e-Commerce

FaMeTN facilitates MSMEs in participating in trade fairs and exhibitions across India and globally through its Sponsorship Policy. In 2024–25, it supported five associations/organizations with sponsorships worth Rs.93.54 lakh and 144 MSMEs with sponsorships worth Rs.113.95 lakh.

As part of these efforts, a FaMeTN pavilion was set up at the International Engineering Sourcing Show (IESS XII) in Chennai from 27 to 29, November 2024, where 65 MSMEs participated and showcased their products. Additionally, FaMeTN participated in SOUMEX 2024, a three-day International Exhibition and B2B meet held at Chennai Trade Centre. The organisation also made a notable presence in the 7th Edition of the Electrical and Industrial Electronics Trade Fair, held in Coimbatore from August 9 to 12, 2024.

C. Bridging the gap between the Buyer and the MSMEs: Business to Business (B2B)

MSMEs rely on large industries for their market opportunities. To bridge the gap between large industries and MSMEs, FaMeTN has organized several Vendor Development Programmes (VDPs) and B2B

meets in collaboration with Government PSUs and large industries. During the year 2024-25, two Reverse Buyer Seller Meets (RBSM) were conducted in Coimbatore and Chennai in which 589 MSMEs participated. Further, three Vendor Development Programmes were conducted, in which 333 MSMEs benefitted.

6.3. Raising and Accelerating MSME Performance (RAMP)

FaMeTN is the State Nodal Agency for the centrally sponsored Raising and Accelerating MSME Performance (RAMP), a scheme implemented by the Ministry of Micro, Small & Medium Enterprises for improving the access to market, credit, technology upgradation and to address issues of delayed payments and greening of MSMEs.

A sum of Rs.165 Crore has been earmarked for Tamil Nadu under this

programme for various initiatives and interventions over a period of 4 years viz., Digital MSME Facilitation Services, Industry Transformation Maps, Vendor Development Programmes, International Reverse Buyer Seller Meets, Quality Certifications and Intellectual Property Rights among others. Vendors/ Agencies have been identified for implementing Digital MSME Facilitation Services, International Reverse Buyer Seller Meets, Quality Certifications and Intellectual Property Rights. Initiatives under RAMP are at different stages of implementation.

6.4. Quality and Sustainability

The activities under this focus area aims to provide access to affordable, reliable, and sustainable energy for MSMEs. They also work towards upgrading infrastructure and improving industries to make them more sustainable by using the resources efficiently

and adopting clean, eco-friendly technologies.

FaMeTN conducts workshops to facilitate MSMEs to obtain Quality Certifications to increase and expand their access to Indian and global markets. During 2024-25, 20 workshops were conducted for MSMEs on the Zero Defect Zero Effect (ZED) certification programme under RAMP. Consequent to these workshops 1928 ZED Certifications were done.

7. Tamil Nadu Startup and Innovation Mission (TANSIM)

The Tamil Nadu Startup and Innovation Mission was established by the Tamil Nadu Government to position the State as a leading startup ecosystem, with a special focus on startup and innovation activities. It operates under the Micro, Small and Medium Enterprises department and is branded as StartupTN.

StartupTN implements various programs to ensure that startups in Tamil Nadu progress smoothly in their entrepreneurial journey, strengthen the State's startup and innovation ecosystem, and extend entrepreneurship development to all sections of society.

StartupTN is devising and executing various schemes and initiatives across seven

key focus areas, such as promoting awareness of startups and entrepreneurship, strengthening the State's startup ecosystem, enhancing the investment landscape, expanding market access for entrepreneurs, facilitating collaboration among ecosystem stakeholders, developing and supporting incubation centres, and fostering inclusive entrepreneurship to ensure participation from all sections of society.

7.1. Objectives of the organisation

- To facilitate the establishment of 15,000 new startups by providing all necessary support to entrepreneurs during the policy period (2023-2028), as outlined in the Tamil Nadu Startup and Innovation Policy released in September 2023.
- To sustain Tamil Nadu as one of the top three states in the country for a thriving startup ecosystem.

- To ensure the growth of startups in Tier II and Tier III cities while continuing to support startups from larger urban centres.
- To develop Tamil Nadu as the leading State in the country in terms of both the number and quality of incubators.
- To position Tamil Nadu among the top three destinations in India for startup funding.
- To make Tamil Nadu the leading State in the country in terms of the number of women entrepreneurs and entrepreneurs from SC/ST communities.
- To support the growth of startups by fostering strong connections between ecosystem stakeholders.
- To develop a skilled workforce that meets the evolving needs of the startup ecosystem.

- To create sector-specific startup forums that provide tailored support to each industry.
- To establish a conducive environment for startup growth by bringing together venture capitalists and angel investors.
- To make Tamil Nadu the world's premier Knowledge and Innovation Hub by setting up Global Startup Resources Coordination Centres.
- To enhance the capabilities of Tamil Nadu's entrepreneurs, enabling them to compete on the global stage.
- To streamline processes for startups to access seed funding and equity investments from the State Government.
- To formulate strategies and initiatives that ensure inclusive growth in entrepreneurship and business opportunities for all sections of society.

- To facilitate collaboration between corporates and major industries, encouraging them to procure products and services from startups.

The various activities carried out by StartupTN to strengthen the startup ecosystem in the state have enabled Tamil Nadu to achieve the following milestones:

- The number of DPIIT-registered startups in Tamil Nadu has surpassed 10,000.
- Startup India released a ranking for 2022, evaluating States based on their startup ecosystem activities. Tamil Nadu secured the 'Best Performer' title, the highest recognition among Indian states.
- Chennai ranked 18th in Asia in the Global Startup Ecosystem Report 2024 by Startup Genome.

- Chennai featured among Asia's top 10 for Affordable Talent, reinforcing its position as a leading tech talent hub.
- Tamil Nadu was recognised as a model state for innovation by the Atal Innovation Mission, NITI Aayog.
- Tamil Nadu ranked among the top three startup ecosystems in India in Outlook Business Magazine's Startup Outperformers 2024.

7.2. Tamil Nadu Startup and Innovation Policy

As per the Tamil Nadu Startup and Innovation Policy released in September 2023, the organisation's long-term vision is to position Tamil Nadu among the top 20 global startup destinations, as per international standards, by 2032. The policy focuses on:

- Increasing startups' contribution to the State's GDP.
- Providing startups in Tamil Nadu with a conducive environment and seamless support throughout their journey.
- Enabling business expansion by facilitating access to both domestic and global markets.
- Implementing a robust system that integrates intellectual talent and infrastructure, thereby attracting investments for startups in Tamil Nadu.
- Adapting to market trends and scaling existing startups into leading brands with the capacity to generate employment and attract potential investors.
- Establishing Tamil Nadu as the premier hub for intellectual talent in the startup ecosystem.

- Positioning Tamil Nadu as a model state for equitable progress within the country and beyond.
- Promoting startups that develop sustainable business solutions through the ESG framework.

7.3. Major Activities of StartupTN Regional Hubs

Regional hubs have been established in Madurai, Tirunelveli, Erode, Salem, Cuddalore, Hosur, and Thanjavur to carry out startup-related activities to encourage startups across the entire state. Regional hubs were introduced in Coimbatore and Trichy in the 2024-25 financial year. Regional Hubs are instrumental in supporting startups in their respective regions and developing the startup ecosystem by organising the available resources. These regional hubs have organised more than 364 programmes, reaching out to more than

38,763 startups, aspiring entrepreneurs, and students.

7.4. TANSEED

Under the Tamil Nadu Startup Seed Fund Scheme (TANSEED), seed funds are being disbursed to early-stage startups. To foster gender equality within the Startup ecosystem and in alignment with the sustainable development goal 5, 25% of the beneficiaries under this scheme has been reserved for Women-led startups and are supported with Rs.15 lakh. As per the Sustainable Development Goals 13, 14 and 15 Startups under rural impact sectors, circular economy and green tech sectors receive Rs.15 lakh each, while other startups receive Rs. 10 lakh. So far, 169 startups have benefited from the scheme, collectively generating a turnover of over Rs. 500 crore and creating more than 2,000 jobs. Considering the scheme's success and the

rising number of startups in Tamil Nadu, the fund allocation for the scheme has been increased to Rs.20 crore, with a plan to support more number of startups.

7.5. Tamil Nadu SC/ST Startup Fund

The Tamil Nadu SC/ST Startup Fund was announced in the 2022-23 financial year to promote inclusive growth across all communities. Under this scheme, equity or debt-based investments are made in startups run by SC/ST entrepreneurs. So far, 41 startups have received sanction orders for equity investments totalling Rs.56.63 crore, with the investment being made in various stages.

7.6. MentorTN Portal

By connecting Startup aspirants and Startups with industry veterans, the platform facilitates knowledge transfer, reduces business failures, and accelerates innovation.

This digital solution provides access to guidance across the State, particularly benefiting Startups from tier-2 & 3 cities and rural areas seeking specialized expertise for sustainable growth. So far 1124 Startup aspirants and Startups as mentees have registered and 325 mentors have joined the portal. Different kinds of offline and online mentorship cohort programs are facilitated through this initiative.

7.7. Scaleup Incubators

Various initiatives have been taken to strengthen incubation centres in Tamil Nadu through capacity-building programmes and financial support. Over the past three years, several programmes have been conducted to enhance the capabilities of 116 incubation managers. Additionally, Rs. 1.20 crore has been allocated for the development of incubation centres. Among the incubators trained under this initiative, 17 have

received a total seed fund of Rs 65.90 crore from Startup India. A committee comprising policymakers, entrepreneurs, mentors, and investors has been formed to improve the functioning of incubators. In collaboration with this committee, StartupTN has developed the Tamil Nadu Incubator Maturity Model, a self-assessment tool for evaluation and further development. StartupTN has developed a dedicated platform called StartupTN Catalyst for the development of incubators. So far, 123 incubators have been onboarded onto this platform.

7.8. Call Centre

A dedicated call centre has been established to address queries related to startups and entrepreneurship. Assistance is provided in both Tamil and English, ensuring accessibility for all entrepreneurs. So far, 7,600 calls have been attended to, providing information on various topics such as DPIIT

registration, StartupTN's initiatives and benefits, incubation centres, and investment opportunities.

7.9. Tamil Nadu Startup Thiruvizha

Tamil Nadu Startup Thiruvizha, organised by StartupTN, plays a vital role in strengthening the State's startup ecosystem by bringing together entrepreneurs, investors, and industry leaders. It facilitates networking, investment opportunities, and knowledge sharing while showcasing Tamil Nadu's potential and success stories. The second edition of Startup Thiruvizha was held in Madurai, attracting over 20,000 participants. A total of 103 startups launched their products at the event.

A landmark event for Startup growth in Chennai titled 'Startup Chennai' was conducted during November, 2024 at IIT Madras Research Park. The event was inaugurated by Hon'ble Deputy Chief

Minister. The event brought more than 1000 stakeholders from the Startup community. Various initiatives were launched during the event including the product launch. The day-long event also witnessed the knowledge sharing by eminent speakers and facilitating wider networking opportunities.

7.10. TANFUND Portal

The TANFUND Portal, aimed at connecting startups with investors, was inaugurated during the Tamil Nadu Global Investors Meet 2024 (TN GIM). About 137 Investor Connect programmes have been conducted under the initiative, connecting 1,019 startups with investors. 22 startups have raised Rs. 129.55 crore through the initiative so far.

7.11. Smart Card

The Smart Card scheme was launched to benefit startups in accessing various services and products related to Legal &

Compliance, Marketing/Business Consulting, Finance and Insurance, Human Resources and Smart Workspace, Software and IT/ITES, and Media and Advertisement at highly subsidised rates. So far, 4,400 startups have been issued with smart cards.

7.12. Periyar Social Justice Venture Lab

The Periyar Social Justice Venture Lab was launched to provide support programmes specifically for social enterprises, climate action startups, and startups offering solutions to government challenges. This initiative gives preference to entrepreneurs from marginalised communities such as Scheduled Castes and Scheduled Tribes. It includes various interventions to enhance competencies in business models, marketing, finance, technology, team building, and other critical aspects of venture development. So far, 33 startups benefitted under this initiative. In

the current financial year, it has been planned to support startups working in social impact and climate action, as well as those led by people from marginalised communities, in raising funds, access to mentors and access to market.

7.13. Startups to Government Buy Day

StartupTN is organising Startup to Government (S2G) events to facilitate procurement by government departments and public sector undertakings from startups. A total of 91 startups have participated in 16 S2G Buy Day events conducted in coordination with various government departments. Eight startups have secured work orders worth Rs.1.40 crore through these events, which aim to create market access for startups. S2G Buy Day events will continue to be organised in collaboration with all Government departments in the current financial year.

Moreover, it has been planned to hold an Annual Procurement Summit involving all the organisations. So far, 1375 startups have been onboarded in the Government E-Marketplace (GeM) portal and since April 2021, the startups have secured Rs.1033 crores worth of orders.

7.14. StartupTN Pre-Incubation Centres

Pre-Incubation Centres are being set up to support early-stage startups with scalable innovations. These centres are being established in academic and research institutions across Tier II, III, and IV cities in Tamil Nadu. StartupTN aims to establish 100 such centres initially. Orders have been issued to allocate Rs.7.5 lakh per centre, totalling Rs.1.87 crore, for the establishment of 25 centres across various parts of the State.

7.15. Open Innovation Challenge Portal

Innovation challenges are conducted to identify startups that can provide innovative solutions to challenges faced by the government and corporations, thereby creating market opportunities for startups, as per the Sustainable Development Goal 9.

A) So far, 15 open innovation challenges have been conducted, releasing 150 challenges and have received innovative solutions for them. These challenges have focused on sectors such as automotive technology, rural livelihood development, animal husbandry, sustainable development, and emerging technologies.

B) Additionally, corporate innovation challenges were conducted in collaboration with 10 corporations and have received solutions for 50 challenges from 175 startups. Out of

these, 25 startups were shortlisted and provided with market access opportunities.

In the current financial year, innovation challenges will be conducted in collaboration with government departments, public sector undertakings, district administrations, and new corporates, further expanding market access opportunities for startups.

7.16. Global Coordination Centre

To attract investments and support Tamil Nadu Startups in the global arena, StartupTN has established a Global Coordination Centre in Dubai. So far, 53 startups have been benefited from the centre through services such as company registration, market access opportunities, and shared workspace facilities. Additionally, Startups will be facilitated to register their

company in the United Arab Emirates in this financial year.

7.17. Startup delegation Participation to Global Events

StartupTN's delegation to SLUSH during November 2024, held in Finland was aimed at strengthening global partnerships, investor relations, and Tamil Nadu's startup ecosystem expansion. StartupTN provided opportunities for 16 startups from Tamil Nadu to participate in the event. Key engagements included strategic partnerships with different stakeholders.

At GITEX Expand North Star, held in Dubai during October, 2024, 18 Tamil Nadu-based startups were selected and fully supported by the Government of Tamil Nadu to showcase their innovations and connect with global markets. The event provided over 100 business matchmaking and investor interactions, facilitating startup expansions

into the Middle East, Africa, and Europe. StartupTN also formalized strategic partnerships, including a Letter of Intent with SHERAA (Sharjah Entrepreneurship Center) and an Expression of Interest with DIFC (Dubai International Financial Centre) Innovation Hub to provide startups with access to funding, mentorship, and soft-landing support.

7.18. Startup Competition and Training for Students

StartupTN, in collaboration with Naan Mudhalvan has organised Niral Thiruvizha 2024 to identify and nurture innovative startup ideas across Tamil Nadu. The grand finale was held in September 2024, where 50 selected teams received validation and prize money. Additionally, work is underway to further develop 144 promising ideas with the support of mentors, aiming to transform them into successful startups.

7.19.Special Schemes and Initiatives for Women Entrepreneurs

Various schemes and initiatives are being rolled out to support women-led startups. Fifty percent of the startups from Tamil Nadu registered on the DPIIT platform are either led by women as founders or co-founders. At present, 5,174 startups are women-led.

(A) Special Allocation in the Tamil Nadu Startup Seed Fund Scheme

While Rs. 10 lakh is disbursed to startups under the Tamil Nadu Startup Seed Fund Scheme, the Tamil Nadu government has enhanced this seed fund to Rs. 15 lakh for startups run by women entrepreneurs. Furthermore, 25% of the beneficiaries under the scheme each year are reserved for women entrepreneurs. So far, 66 startups

run by women entrepreneurs have received Rs. 7.44 crore in funding.

(B) Incubation Support Scheme for Women

A Government order providing a special package for women-led startups was released and is being implemented by StartupTN. As per the order, women entrepreneurs can avail of up to Rs. 2 lakh to cover their incubation centre fees at State government-approved incubation centres. So far, Rs. 14.71 lakh has been distributed as a subsidy to women entrepreneurs.

(C) English Communication Training for Women Entrepreneurs

A 20-hour spoken English training programme for women was designed and organised to enhance their communication skills, enabling them to participate in

investment, market access, and networking events. More than 50 women benefited from the training programme, which was conducted by StartupTN in collaboration with the US Consulate in Chennai

(D) Thozhili – Women-Exclusive Startup Boot Camp

StartupTN is conducting two-day women-exclusive startup boot camps titled as Thozhili, to empower and support aspiring women entrepreneurs. This initiative is dedicated to equipping women with essential skills, knowledge, and a robust network to launch and grow successful startups. More than 200 women have benefited from four boot camps conducted in Coimbatore, Kanniyakumari, Erode, and Chennai.

(E) Mentoring Cohort for Women Entrepreneurs

Expert guidance from industry professionals is crucial in helping entrepreneurs scale their startups. Women entrepreneurs require specialised mentorship to overcome unique challenges in their entrepreneurial journey. Cohort based mentoring programmes are being conducted to them. A cohort of women entrepreneurs received continuous guidance from mentors and experts through this programme.

7.20. Integrated Online Platform (One TN):

An integrated online platform that brings all information on facilities and services offered by all government departments and private institutions related to startups and innovation under one roof is being developed. This platform is designed to benefit entrepreneurs, aspiring startup founders, investors, and other stakeholders. It is planned for launch in this financial year.

7.21. Transgender and Differently-Abled Startup Fund

A special seed fund in the form of a grant has been launched for startups run by differently-abled individuals and transgender entrepreneurs. The process of identifying suitable beneficiaries under this scheme is currently underway.

7.22. Thozhil Nayam

Thozhil Nayam is a modern design studio aimed at helping entrepreneurs design their products to meet the requirements of e-commerce marketplaces. So far, 60 startups have been shortlisted for assistance under this scheme.

7.23. Global Startup Summit

The Global Startup Summit is set to take place this financial year to strengthen Tamil Nadu's startup ecosystem. The summit aims to create international market

opportunities for startups in the State by facilitating MoUs with global startup organizations, enabling participation from international entities in exhibitions to help local startups understand global ecosystems, and organizing investor pavilion to help startups explore funding opportunities.
